# MUCH - MANY A LOT OF - LOTS OF



= a large quantity of something

*Much* and *Many* are mainly used in negative sentences and questions. They are not common in affirmative sentences though still possible. *Much* is used with uncountable nouns. *Many* is used with plural countable nouns.

## MUCH

- + UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS
- I don't have much time.
- He doesn't need much money.
- Does it use much electricity?

## MANY

- + PLURAL COUNTABLE NOUNS
- There aren't many chairs in the room.
- I don't have many friends.
- Do you think many people will go?

With affirmative sentences, we prefer *a lot of* instead of *much/many*. *A lot of/lots of* are not common in negative sentences or questions. *A lot of* can be used with countable nouns and uncountable nouns.  
a lot of = lots of

## A LOT OF

- + UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS
- I need a lot of coffee.  
(= I need lots of coffee.)
- There is a lot of traffic today.

## A LOT OF

- + PLURAL COUNTABLE NOUNS
- She has a lot of friends.  
(= She has lots of friends.)
- There are a lot of cars on the street.

Therefore, the evidence suggests that too much homework will not boost academic results, but instead it puts quite a lot of added negative pressure on the students. Furthermore, stress from high expectations and an overwhelming work-load contribute to the increasing suicide rate in Hong Kong.**

**Now is the time for teachers to stop handing out too much homework to students. Students must be provided a chance for self-learning and given time to enjoy life.**

**Margaret FUNG SHUK CHEUNG 2A (7)**

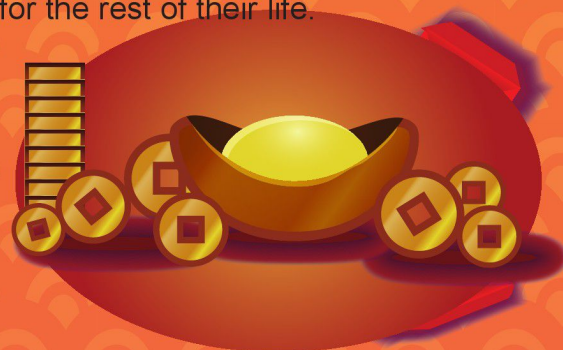

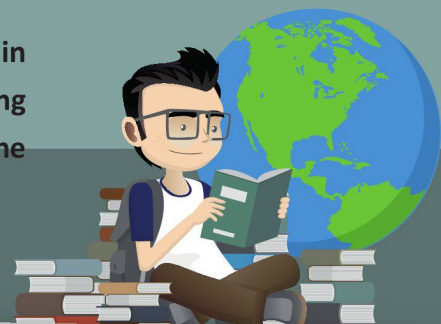

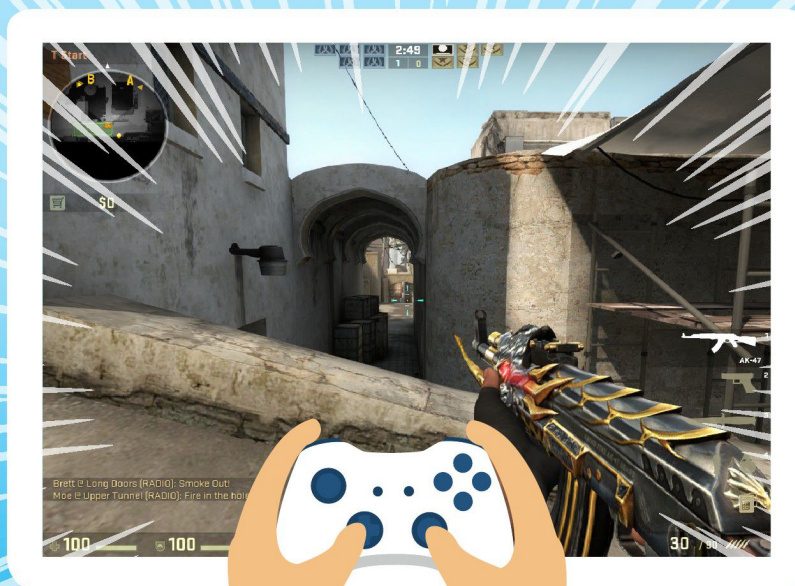
Cross Fire: The Gunners King is coproduced by the Korean companies Smilegate and Tencent Games. It took 3 years to create this genuine first-person shooter game.

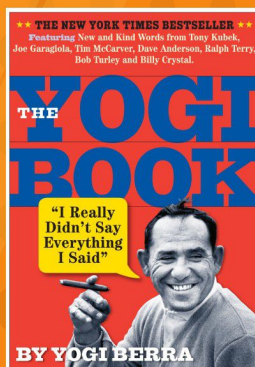
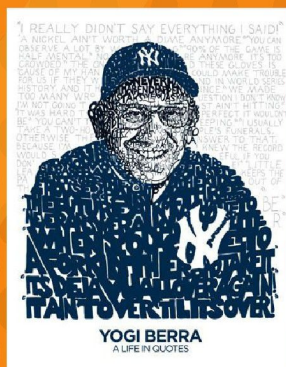
Baseball is the United States' national pastime. Meaning for many years it was the favourite sport of America. 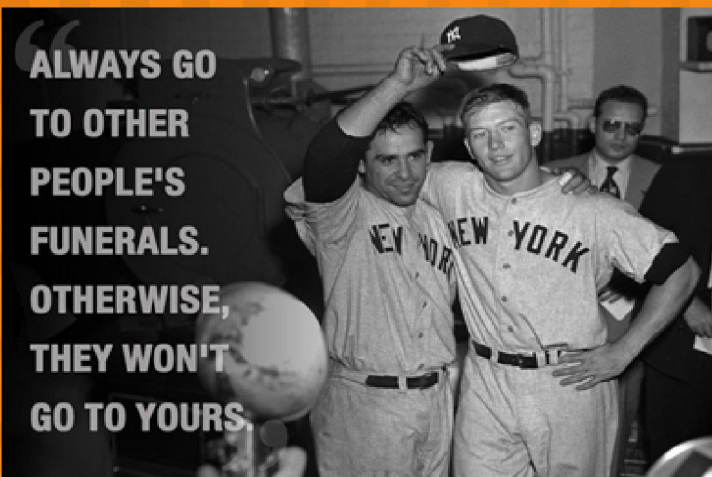
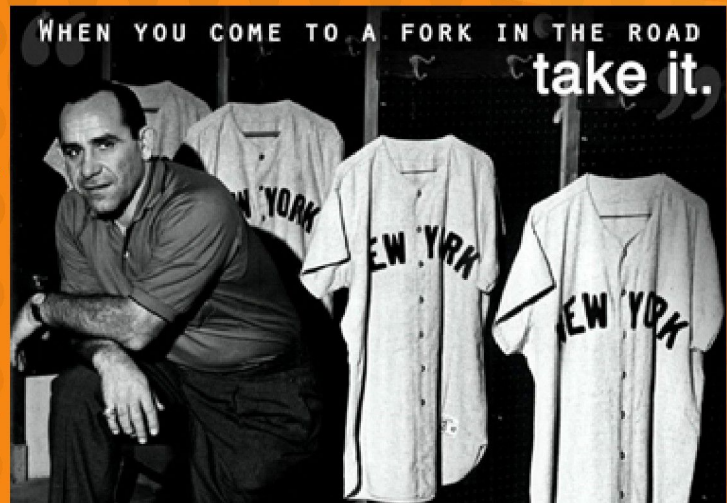

He was a true champion winning 9 championships with the New York Yankees as the catcher. Catcher is a grueling position because a catcher has to squat the entire game and get hit with hard baseballs, not good for the knees and it hurts a lot.



Yogi Berra created many colorful baseball expressions that we use in American-English which we call "Yogisms". Though they may sound silly and make little sense, Yogi's baseball slogans are actually very wise if you look a little deeper. I'll share just a few of my favorites.

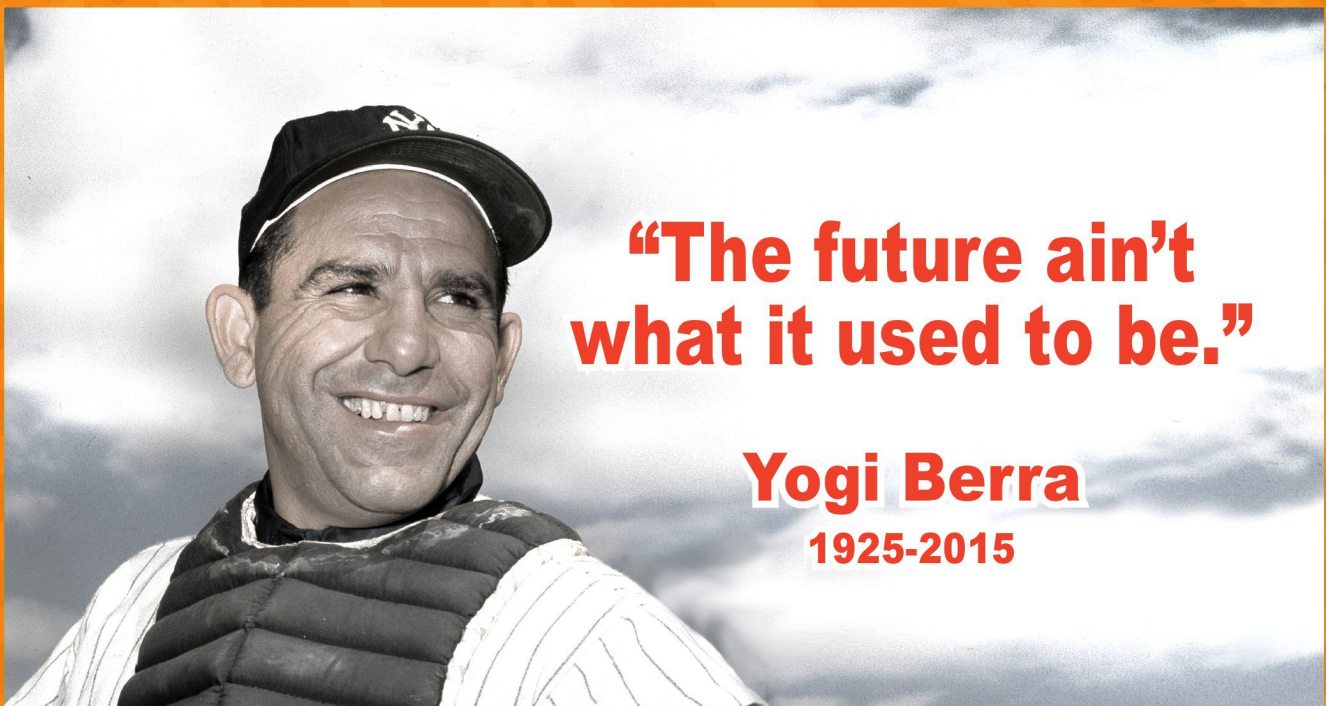
#1 “If you come to a fork in the road, take it.” A fork in the road is a metaphor meaning that you have a decision to make between two things. Yogi twists this metaphor to mean to make new opportunities for yourself or think outside of your given options.

#2—“If you ask me anything I don’t know, I am not going to answer.” This means that too many people blabber and talk about things they are not very knowledgeable about rather than admit they don’t know something.



#3—“Make a game plan and stick to it. Unless it is not working.” This means be consistent and follow your plan even if it is not easy. But also learn from your mistakes and don’t be stubborn to change or modify.

# Failure, Courage & Success



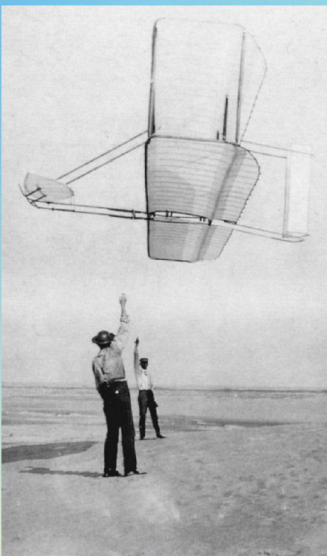
Everyone experiences a failure, that's just a part of life. Look at the Wright brothers – the two American inventors flew the world's first successful airplane.
